Labor Market Review

December 2009

Summary. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in Ohio rose from 10.6 percent in November 2009 to 10.9 percent in December 2009. The national rate was unchanged at 10.0 percent. Total employment in Ohio, at 5,260,000, was down 22,000 over the month. The number not employed but seeking work advanced 17,000 to 641,000. Nonagricultural wage and salary employment (seasonally adjusted) totaled 5,086,900 in December, down 16,700 from November.

Goods-Producing Industries. Employment in goods-producing industries, at 802,400, advanced 100. Manufacturing increased 1,400 as a gain in durable goods (+3,400) more than offset a loss in nondurable goods (-2,000). The construction workforce declined 1,300. Total mining and logging employment was unchanged.

Service-Providing Industries. The workforce in service-providing industries dropped 16,800 from November to 4,284,500. Declines were posted in trade, transportation, and utilities (-7,500), professional and business services (-6,500), other services (-2,500), and government (-1,000). Small increases occurred in leisure and hospitality (+300), information (+200), financial activities (+100), and educational and health services (+100).

Over the Year. Ohio's unemployment rate, at 10.9 percent in December 2009, was up from 7.4 percent in December 2008. The national rate rose from 7.4 percent to 10.0 percent over the year. Total employment in Ohio was 274,000 lower than December 2008, while total unemployment was up 196,000. Nonagricultural payroll employment fell 184,900 over the year. Manufacturing was down 89,200 due to losses in durable goods (-73,600) and nondurable goods (-15,600). Trade, transportation, and utilities declined 35,900. Other industries with lower employment were professional and business services (-17,200), construction (-16,000), financial activities (-12,400), information (-9,100), leisure and hospitality (-6,100), government (-4,000), other services (-3,000), and mining and logging (-200). Educational and health services advanced 8,200.

Factory Hours and Earnings. Production workers in manufacturing industries in Ohio earned an average of \$755.08 per week in December, up \$14.06 from November. Their average workweek of 40.1 hours was 0.6 hours longer. Over the year, average weekly earnings in manufacturing rose \$5.85. Durable-goods earnings (\$827.43) were up \$19.83 from November and up \$11.03 from December 2008. Earnings in nondurable goods, at \$616.57, were down \$4.18 over the month, but up \$4.67 over the year.

Benefits and Costs. Initial claims filed under the Ohio Unemployment Compensation Law numbered 116,368 in December, up 34.3 percent from November but down 26.6 percent from December 2008. Total benefits paid rose 5.6 percent to \$224.8 million. The average weekly benefit payment of \$362.50 was \$22.54 higher than November. The average weekly number of benefit recipients, at 138,235, was down 9.4 percent from last month. At the end of December, there were 227,429 active employer accounts.

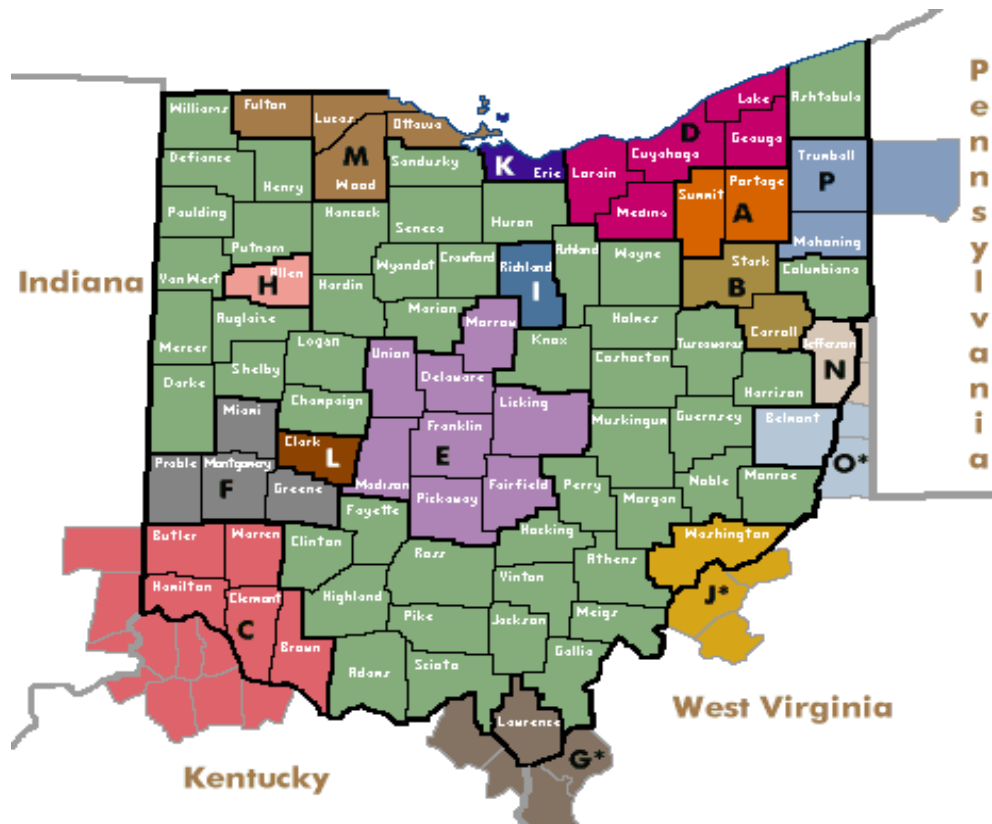

Nonfarm payroll employment in the Akron metropolitan area totaled 325,100 in December 2009, down 900 from November. The workforce in goods-producing industries, at 50,700, decreased 700 due to less business in mining, logging, and construction. Total employment in manufacturing remained at the November level. Losses in leisure and hospitality, government, and other services more than offset gains in professional and business services and trade, transportation, and utilities to lower employment in the service-providing sector 200.

Nonagricultural wage and salary employment fell 12,600 between December 2008 and December 2009. The service-providing sector lost 7,900 jobs. The largest declines occurred in trade, transportation, and utilities (-3,400), professional and business services (-2,200), and leisure and hospitality (-2,000). Employment in educational and health services advanced 900. Losses in manufacturing (-4,000) and mining, logging, and construction (-700) lowered employment in goods-producing industries 4,700.

Nonfarm payroll employment in the Canton-Massillon metropolitan area totaled 164,700 in December 2009, down 1,300 from November. Declines in government and professional and business services helped lower employment in the service-providing sector 800. The workforce in goods-producing industries, at 33,800, decreased 500 due to less business in mining, logging, and construction and a slight reduction in manufacturing.

Nonagricultural wage and salary employment fell 6,900 between December 2008 and December 2009. The service-providing sector lost 3,700 jobs. The most significant declines were posted in trade, transportation, and utilities (-1,100), professional and business services (-900), and government (-900). Losses in manufacturing (-2,700) and mining, logging, and construction (-500) lowered employment in goods-producing industries 3,200 over the year.

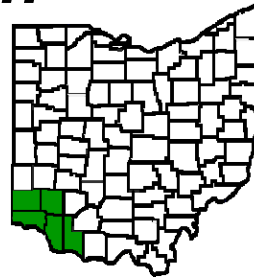

Nonfarm payroll employment in the Cincinnati-Middletown metropolitan area totaled 1,006,300 in December 2009, up 1,700 from November. The service-providing sector added 1,800 jobs. Gains in leisure and hospitality, trade, transportation, and utilities, and professional and business services more than offset a decline in government. The workforce in goods-producing industries, at 147,700, decreased 100 over the month as a reduction in manufacturing negated a slight increase in mining, logging, and construction.

Nonagricultural wage and salary employment fell 31,900 between December 2008 and December 2009. Losses in most sectors lowered employment in service-providing industries 18,800. The largest decrease occurred in trade, transportation, and utilities (-10,100). Employment in the goods-producing sector dropped 13,100 due to over-the-year declines in manufacturing (-12,100) and mining, logging, and construction (-1,000).

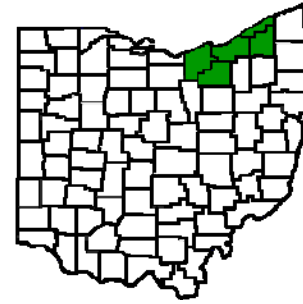

Nonfarm payroll employment in the Cleveland-Elyria-Mentor metropolitan area totaled 999,700 in December 2009, down 9,900 from November. Declines in professional and business services, other services, and government lowered employment in the service-providing sector 8,000. The workforce in the goods-producing sector, at 143,000, decreased 1,900 as less business in mining, logging, and construction negated an increase in durable-goods manufacturing.

Nonagricultural wage and salary employment fell 42,300 between December 2008 and December 2009. Service-providing industries lost 25,300 jobs as declines were posted in most sectors. The most significant decreases occurred in professional and business services (-13,100), leisure and hospitality (-4,700), trade, transportation, and utilities (-3,400), and financial activities (-3,300). Employment in educational and health services advanced 2,900 over the year. Losses in manufacturing (-10,400) and mining, logging, and construction (-6,600) lowered employment in the goods-producing sector 17,000.

Nonfarm payroll employment in the Columbus metropolitan area totaled 925,600 in December 2009, down 7,500 from November. Decreases in professional and business services, leisure and hospitality, and financial activities helped lower employment in service-providing industries 6,000. The workforce in goods-producing industries, at 100,200, fell 1,500 due to less business in mining, logging, and construction and a slight reduction in manufacturing.

Nonagricultural wage and salary employment dropped 16,400 between December 2008 and December 2009. Service-providing industries lost 11,200 jobs. The most significant decreases were posted in trade, transportation, and utilities (-7,300), leisure and hospitality (-4,900), and financial activities (-2,000). Technical Notes

Civilian Labor Force Estimates

Civilian Labor Force. Estimated number of persons 16 years of age and over, employed or unemployed during week including 12th of month, distributed by place of residence.

Total Employed. Includes nonagricultural wage and salary workers, the self-employed, unpaid family workers, domestics, agricultural workers, and persons involved in labor disputes. Employment distributed by place of residence.

Total Unemployed. Estimated number of persons, by place of residence, who did not work during reference week and were looking for work, whether or not eligible for unemployment compensation. Includes those who did not work and were waiting to be called back to an old job or to report to a new job.

Nonagricultural Wage and Salary Employment

Collection. Nonagricultural wage and salary employment as well as hours and earnings estimates based on monthly reports from sample of employers. Under cooperative arrangement with U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, Ohio Department of Job and Family Services Bureau of Labor Market Information mails, edits, and processes Ohio reports, which are subsequently incorporated in national data.

Industrial Classification. Employer establishments classified by industry based on their principal product or service. The "North American Industry Classification System" (U.S. Office of Management and Budget, Washington, D.C., 2002) used for classification.

Coverage. Monthly reports on employment and (for many industries) payroll and hours obtained from approximately 12,100 Ohio employers.

Nonagricultural Employment. Persons who worked during, or received pay for, any part of pay periods which include 12th of the month, distributed by place of employment. Includes persons on paid sick leave, paid holiday, or paid vacation. Excluded are persons laid off, on strike, or on unpaid vacation during entire reporting period. Proprietors, the self-employed, unpaid family workers, farm workers, and domestic workers also excluded. Government employment covers only civilian employees. Full-time teachers considered employed during the summer vacation period, whether or not paid in those months.

Estimating Method. Total employment is estimated from the employment of establishments reporting for two consecutive months, as follows:

$$\text{Total Employment (Current month)} = \frac{\text{Current Sample Employment}}{\text{Previous Sample Employment}} \times \text{Total Employment (Previous month)}$$

Benchmark Data. Employment estimates compared annually with complete count of employment, by industry. Where revisions necessary, monthly estimates adjusted to new benchmark. Following revisions to new benchmark, industry data projected forward to current month by use of sample trends. Basic source of benchmark information is tabulations of employment data, by industry and area, compiled from contribution reports of employers covered under Ohio Unemployment Compensation Law. Data are based on March 2008 benchmark.

Seasonally Adjusted Estimates

Seasonal Adjustment. To facilitate interpretation of underlying economic trends, selected Nonagricultural Wage and Salary Employment series are presented with short-term effects of seasonal patterns removed.

Hours and Earnings

Method of Computing Averages. Average hours computed by dividing total production worker hours worked during one week (the seven-day periods which include 12th of the month) by number of production workers reported for such week. Average hourly earnings computed by dividing total production worker payroll for one week by total production worker hours for week. Average weekly earnings derived by multiplying average hourly earnings by average weekly hours.

Definitions. Definitions of production or similar workers, payroll, and hours-from which average hours and earnings data are derived--follow:

Production Workers. Includes working supervisors and all nonsupervisory workers (including group leaders and trainees) engaged in fabricating, processing, assembling, inspection, receiving, storage, handling, packing, warehousing, shipping, maintenance, repair, janitorial and guard services, product development, auxiliary production for plant's own use (such as power plant), and record keeping and other services closely associated with production operations.

Nonsupervisory Workers. Includes employees (not above working supervisory level) such as office and clerical workers, repairers, salespersons, operators, drivers, attendants, service employees, line installers, laborers, accountants, janitors, guards, and other employees whose services are closely associated with those of occupations listed.

Payroll. Represents payroll for full- and part-time production, construction, or nonsupervisory workers who received pay for any part of pay periods which include 12th of month. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, group insurance, withholding tax, bonds, and union dues; also includes pay for overtime, holidays, vacations, and sick leave paid directly by the firm. Bonuses (unless earned and paid regularly each pay period), tips, pay not earned in pay period reported (such as retroactive pay), and value of free rent, fuel, meals, or other payments in kind, excluded.
